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Justin LaVoie Premieres At The Senate Sunday, May 18, 2014 3:00 p.m.

This month's organ concert brings a new artist to the Senate Theater; an artist that has won world acclaim for his artistry, and an artist that we are proud to say is from right here in the Metro Detroit area!

Justin LaVoie is a passionate, 19-year old organist who possesses a steadfast dedication to the theatre organ art form. His fascination with the instrument began at the age of seven, after hearing his first theatre organ recording. This newfound interest compelled Justin to take electronic organ lessons at a local music store for the next six years. In 2008, he attended the ATOS Summer Youth Camp in Chicago, subsequently participating in the 2009, 2010, and 2012 camps. These thoroughly enjoyable and educational opportunities motivated Justin to mature in his musicianship, and he began studying with renowned theatre organist Jelani Eddington in 2010. Shortly thereafter, he began performing movie overtures and intermissions for the public on the Barton organ at the Redford Theatre in Detroit.

In recognition of his diligent musical studies, Justin was named ATOS Student of the Year in 2010, and more recently he won the 2013 ATOS Young Organist Competition, achieving the prestigious title of Overall Winner. In addi-

tion to his theatre organ pursuits, Justin studies classical organ with Rick Cucchi, and occasionally plays for services at his home parish. Away from the console, he enjoys listening to a wide variety of music, cooking, spending time outdoors, and maintaining his extensive collection of early 20th century box cameras.

Justin will be performing at this year's annual convention for the American Theatre Organ Society on the 3-manual, 26-rank Wurlitzer organ in-

stalled in the Carl Wright Auditorium at Manual High School in Indianapolis, Indiana. Justin made a great impression on both artists and attendees at last year's convention in Atlanta, Georgia. We are thrilled to bring him to the Senate Theater for his first concert for DTOS. You don't want to miss this exciting concert!

Doors to the Senate Theater will open at 2:00 p.m. with the concert starting at 3:00 p.m. We look forward to seeing you there!

Exciting News About Our Senate Marquee

To our amazement, the neon letters and stars on our marquee still work!! Recently we had a sign company do an evaluation of our original, rare SENATE sign and when electric current was applied to the neon tubes, they lit up!! A worker from the sign company went up on a ladder truck and attached wires to some of the letters and stars, one at a time, and the glass was intact, and the neon gas inside still illuminated. He didn't try every letter on both sides, but this is very encouraging news. Most of us had no idea that the letters (and stars) still worked. The bad news is that the trans-

formers for the higher voltage that is required to light neon, all need to be replaced. Also, the main electrical supply to the sign also needs to be brought up to modern code. But, according to the sign company, is all repairable, and our sign can light up brightly once more!

Our Marquee is proving to be our number one way of attracting people to our public events. As we have been polling ticket buyers about how they heard about the event they are coming to; Time and time again, the answer is that they saw it on the marquee. Decades ago the neon was shut

off, and white "flood" lights were used to wash the sign with light. This allowed passers by at night to see the sign somewhat, but was a far cry from the colorful neon letters of the original vintage sign. The sign company will fix the letters, and get them illuminated again as a first step. The stars will follow. The small white light bulbs that ran down the sign could be done in the future as another phase of restoration of our historic sign. Apparently there are not too many of these types of signs left in Michigan, and the sign company is familiar with its history as well as manufac-

ture. They have also hinted that we might be able to qualify for some grant monies to help restore the sign, as long as it's done to original specifications.

Lighting the S E N A T E again on both sides of the sign will definitely be a "sign" to all that travel past the theater that we are "open for business" again. Many of our neighbors coming to the theater think that we have been closed for 50 years, and are already thanking us for re-opening the theater. Wait till they see this!!

I had great intentions of starting a series of articles that describe the various parts of our prized Wurlitzer Theater Organ in greater detail so that you can have a greater appreci-


ation for the work that goes into keeping the instrument in working condition. Unfortunately, I am finding that I have to have a series of surgeries to keep me in working condition,
